Tanka is a form of Japanese poetry, which translates to "short song," written in five lines, with a 5/7/5/7/7 syllable count form. Tanka employs a **turn**, which marks the pivot from an image to a personal response to that image. This turn is located on the third line, connecting the *kami-no-ku*, or upper poem, with the *shimo-no-ku*, or lower poem. Modern Tanka often include figurative language, such as metaphors, similes, personification of hyperbole.
